
Denotation and Connotation

Denotation

The strict dictionary meaning of a word



Connotation



The emotional and imaginative association surrounding a word

Purposes of Words

To label things


I live in a house.



Purposes of Words

To express a point of view

You may live in a house, but we live in a home.



Point of View

*Q***Positive**

We bought inexpensive souvenirs at the amusement park.

a Negative

We bought

cheap souvenirs

at the amusement


park.

Point of View: Positive



- Everyone had a
 (smile, smirk) on his/her face on the ride home.
- Serveryone had a smile on his/her face on the way home.

Point of View: Negative



I ate a (soggy, moist) sandwich.

I ate a *soggy* sandwich

Positive? You Decide!

average mediocre

childish childlike

spit saliva

antique old-fashioned

Context Clues

Words or phrases that help the reader understand a difficult word



Using Context Clues

- The parrot was able to (mimic, mock) human voices.
- The parrot was able to mimic human voices.



Context Clues: You Decide!

- 1. The (odor, fragrance) of apple blossoms filled the entire valley.
- 2. A (swarm, bunch) of bees filled the air near the hive.
 - 3. Tammy (delayed, hesitated) for a moment, then went on speaking.

Example: Residence vs. Home

- The old woman left the bus quickly on her way to visit her friend in her retirement residence.
- a I couldn't wait to get home to see my new dog.
- Ω Connotation: Although the definition is the same, residence has a cold, impersonal feel to it, but home feels warm, cozy, and comforting.
