# WRITING A RESEARCH PAPER

### Choose a Topic

- You will need to choose one topic from the following:
  - A U.S. law or bill that is controversial
    - Health care reform
    - Military draft law
    - Gary marriage laws
    - Any other
  - A famous U.S. trial where justice served is questionable
    - Salem witch trials
    - Brown vs. the Board of Education
    - Scopes monkey trial
    - Patty Hearst trail
    - Other trial from U.S. history

#### Research Your Topic

- First, write your main research question that you want to answer.
- Use your favorite search engine (I like Google! Remember to avoid Wikipedia and other non-academic sources. Need more details? See the resource on Internet Research.).
- Keep track of your sources in order to avoid plagiarizing.
- Remember to get all of the source info for your works cited page:
  - Title of the source
  - Page number(s) of quotes
  - Publisher
  - Authors
  - Date published
  - Date accessed (for a website)
  - URL or the web address

### How Many Sources?

- You will need to support your ideas.
- For this paper, you need a minimum of <u>six</u> sources; however, you may have more.
- Why so many?
  - You need to answer all of your reader's questions.
  - You need to fully support your ideas with research and proof.

#### Citing Your Sources

- Why do we cite?
  - So others know where we got our information.
  - We don't want to take credit for facts and ideas that aren't ours.
  - Sources add credibility to our research.
- Any paper turned in without a formatted Works
  Cited page will be given a grade of zero.
- You must cite each time you use a fact or quote in your paper.
- We will use MLA format for our paper.

## Completing a Works Cited Page

- This is a page that lists all the sources you used in your paper.
- Use the information that you wrote down when you began researching.
- Once again, use the resources available to help you write a Works Cited page:
  - Justice & Injustice Unit
  - Handouts in the Resources section
  - Purdue's OWL

## Organizing Your Thoughts

- Once you have all your research and ideas, it's time to get organized.
- There are many ways to organize your thoughts; choose what works best for you:
  - Graphic Organizers
  - Outlines
  - Web/Spider Map
  - Any other method that works for you!

## Start Writing!

- It may seem overwhelming, but once you have all your research and have organized your thoughts, you have all the tools to write your paper.
- Remember, a research paper is just like a 5paragraph essay, only longer.

# Paragraph 1: Introduction

- Hook
  - Catch your reader's attention
  - Ideas: questions, facts, anecdote, definition, quote...
- Bridge
  - Explains your topic
  - Connects the hook to the thesis
- Thesis Statement
  - Clearly states your main idea and arguments

## Next Paragraphs

- Set the Stage
  - Provide your reader with background information, historical context or other information that will be useful in helping your reader understand your points.
  - Be sure to cite your sources.

# Middle Paragraphs

- Present the facts
  - Support your viewpoint with your research.
  - Cite your sources.

## Last Paragraphs

- Pull it all together
  - Discuss the answer to your question.
  - Explain how your points contribute to your answer.

#### Conclusion

- Wrap it up
  - Restate your thesis.
  - Highlight the significance of this topic.
  - End with a final thought:
    - Tie it back to your hook in your introduction.
    - Leave your readers thinking.
    - Use a quotation, question, or challenge for your reader.

#### Remember Good Writing

- Avoid using contractions in formal writing.
- Never use the words, "In my opinion." Why?
  Because it's assumed the entire paper is your
  opinion supported with credible research.
- Vary your sentence length. Avoid choppy sentences.
- Double check basic mechanics rules.
- Capitalize correctly.
- Punctuate correctly.
- Avoid using the first person, "I."
- Write in the third person.
- Use a formal tone. Avoid slang.
- Use spell-check and grammar check.
