Avoiding Run-ons & Properly Punctuating Clauses

Run-on Sentences

You are using a run-on sentences when you put two or more complete sentences together into one sentence.

My favorite Greek spread is hummus it is very garlicky.



This sentence actually contains two complete sentences. How could you fix it?

My favorite Greek spread is hummus it is very garlicky.

Hint: Do not simply add a comma or you will end up with a comma splice.

Punctuation – Combining 2 Independent Clauses

- 1. Period (.) simply break the run-on into 2 separate and complete sentences.
- 2. Semi-colon (;) place a semi-colon in between the 2 independent clauses.
- O 3. Comma with a Coordinating Conjunction (, and) place a comma after the first independent clause, and then add a coordinating conjunction after the comma
- O *Don't forget that you can always turn one of the ICs into a DC!

Coordinating Conjunctions

- **O FANBOYS**
- The acronym FANBOYS is an easy way to remember the coordinating conjunctions.
- OF: For
 - A: And
 - N: Nor
 - B: But
 - O: Or
 - Y: Yet
 - S: So
